Math – 4 Credits (Multiple sequences)

English – 4 Credits

Science – 4 Credits (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, 4th Science)

Social Studies – 4 Credits

(World Geography, World History, US History, 20th Century World Topics)

Gov't/Econ – 1 Credit = two ½ credits

<u>Foreign Language</u> – 3 Credits (Same language in high school)

Fine Arts – 2 Credits (Same fine art earned in the high school)

PE – 1.5 Credits

Professional Communications – ½ Credit (One semester)

<u>Interpersonal Studies</u> – ½ Credit (One semester)

Technology - 1 Credit

TOK – 1 Credit = two ½ credits

Other Electives – 2.5 Credits

TOTAL # of Credits = 29

Credits vs. Years Taken in High School

<u>Credits Earned and Years Taken in High School are two</u> <u>different things.</u>

- 1. Foreign Language
- 2. Math
- 3. Fine Art

Ex: Scholars that take Foreign Language I and IIA in middle school have earned 1.5 credits of the high school credit requirement for UNHP <u>but still must complete 3 years of foreign language in high school.</u> (IIB, III, and IV at the least, ending fulfillment in Grade 11 at the earliest). As a result, a high school senior could earn a range of 3-5 foreign language credits by the time of graduation.

The same credits vs. years taken in high school clause applies to Fine Art and Math, depending on the grade the scholar took Algebra I.

Communication of Rank

Internal Communication of Rank

- AT THE END OF THE YEAR in 10th
- Top 25%
- End of <u>semester</u> in 11th and 12th at scholar request
- For all scholars in 26%+, scholars and their families will be told what quartile they are in.

External Communication of Rank

- We will eliminate the rank field on the transcript
- Communication of ranks will only be shown on counselor reports in the form of a standardized letter/report, secondary school report, mid-year report, or final year report
- For scholars in the top 25%, counselors will note scholar as Valedictorian, Salutatorian, 'Top 10%' or 'Top 25%'
- For scholars not in the top 25%, counselors will note 'not ranked by Uplift' if asked to provide rank

Pre ACT Test September 4, 2019

Q: What is the PreACT?

A: The PreACT provides valuable practice for the ACT, including questions and scores similar to those on the ACT test. It is designed to help scholars explore a broad range of options for their future. It prepares them not only for their high school coursework but for their post–high school choices as well.

PreACT can serve as an independent program or as the entry point into ACT's College and Career Readiness System.

Q: What is assessed on the PreACT test?

A: PreACT contains four curriculum-based assessments: English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science. The assessment is based on the major areas of high school and postsecondary instructional programs and measures the skills and knowledge needed for college success.

Additionally, the PreACT includes a career exploration component that stimulates scholars' thinking about future plans and relates personal characteristics to career options.

PreACT Benefits

- Test Questions like those on the ACT
- Score reports like those on the ACT
- Ideas for Improvement
- Career suggestions based on your goals and interests
 - PreACT reports provide career possibilities and career suggestions based on your interests and results.
- What is needed for test day?
 - 3 sharpened soft lead (No. 2) pencils and good erasess.
 - An analog watch for pacing
 - Calculator for the math test (visit act.org/theact/calculator to review the ACT calculator policy)
 - Snack & water bottle
 - Wear layers
 - Eat breakfast
 - Get a solid sleep, night before





PSAT October 16, 2019

- The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT)
 - A program co-sponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).
 - A standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT.
 - Only grade 11 will take the PSAT.
 - As an 11th grader, it gives you the chance to enter NMSC scholarship programs and gain access to college and career planning tools.
- o The PSAT/NMSQT measures:
 - Critical Reading Skills
 - Math Problem-Solving Skills
 - Writing Skills
