Does your zip code make a difference? Does your home address have an impact on your success in school, in your career, in your life? The hope is that it shouldn't, but the reality is, it often does. I consider myself lucky to have grown up in a home in a safe neighborhood with college-educated parents, a comfortable household income, and a network of support to guide me through life's challenges. Many of you reading this may have a similar background.

This is not the situation for most Uplift scholars. While we believe that success can be achieved regardless of socioeconomic background, we know that the roadblocks for our scholars are often challenging to overcome.

2019 was a year of continued success for Uplift Education. We have created an impact with our International Baccalaureate® program, achieved national recognition, and prepared more scholars for college than ever before. But this was also a year of insight and introspection. We realized that although we are positioning our scholars for success, we could be—and need to be—doing more. We realized that while we have helped our scholars find their "best fit" college, we can do more to



support them through their college-to-career journey. We realized that while our alumni are earning college degrees at a rate four times the national average, many of them still struggle to find jobs. We realized that we need to be facilitating viable career pathways for those scholars for whom college is not an ideal fit.

As we enter this new year, I am proud to say we are stepping up our game. We have exciting plans to better prepare our scholars for life after high school, and new initiatives to support our alumni beyond college. I am thrilled to be sharing those plans with you in this year's annual report.


Disparity Across Our Community -

Even within our community, the disparity is vast. The next page shows some of the imbalance and obstacles that exist across different zip codes in the metroplex.


The zip codes where Uplift schools are located are some of the most economically disadvantaged areas in the metroplex.




Median Household Income

-Serving the Underserved





Uplift serves more scholars than many of the major public ISDs in North Texas.




Demographic Breakdown of Uplift Scholars

Uplift celebrated its 845 seniors in the Class of 2019 at College Signing Day at AT&T Stadium.

Class of 2019

845 graduating seniors submitted over **5,700** applications and were accepted to more than **450** different colleges and universities, earning a grand total of **\$91.3M** in scholarships and grants.

100% of our graduates were accepted to college and 78% of those will be the first in their family to attend college.







Once again, all eligible Uplift high schools earned national recognition by *U.S. News & World Report*, and were among the top 1% most challenging high schools in the nation.



Reaching Our Highest Potential

While we are proud of all we achieve each year, we know there is always room to improve and learn more. We conducted a comprehensive study of our alumni population in partnership with Bain & Company this past year. We gained valuable insights into both the job market landscape in Dallas/Fort Worth and what happens to our alumni post high school and college graduation.

While our alumni are earning college degrees at $4\times$ the national average for low income students, more than a third of those are still living below the living wage standard. In response to this, we are expanding the ways we support our scholars and our alumni.

70% of our graduates earn a college degree within 6 years of high school graduation.

90% of our graduates earn an economically viable post-secondary credential and enter a career pathway.












Career Exposure

Five years ago, Dr. Susan Hull asked Uplift to partner with Grand Prairie Independent School District on the creation of Uplift Lee Primary, the first in-district public charter school in North Texas. This successful partnership has continued to grow, and we are proud to be working with GPISD to change the landscape of education in North Texas.

Dr. Hull spent 12 years as Superintendent of Grand Prairie ISD and pioneered schools of choice within the district. She was a third-generation superintendent following in the footsteps of her father and grandfather. Dr. Hull's leadership, creative mind, and contagious spirit are missed by all who knew her.







Financial Summary
