Opportunity.

We often think it's something available to everyone in our country. We call America the Land of Opportunity. But when you look at our cities, it's hard to ignore the real story: in our lowincome communities, only 8% of our students are graduating from college within six years of completing high school.

I don't consider 8% a success story. I have three children of my own. I expect them all to graduate from college and have every opportunity to succeed. I look at every scholar at Uplift like I do my own children. I expect each one of them to go to college and graduate as well. I challenge each of us to hold all children to the college expectation.

Our big goal at Uplift Education is to drive college success sky high. We want no less than 70% of our scholars to graduate from college in six years. To accomplish this goal, we must make high-quality learning opportunities available in every grade at every school. We must give parents the opportunity to support their scholar's academic growth. We must give every scholar the opportunity to think about himself or herself as a college graduate.

That's a formula for success, and that's why since 2012, our alumni have been persisting in college at a rate of almost 90%. We are changing the dynamic for low-income students and turning 8% into 70% or greater. Through our proven formula, we prepare them for a future where their big challenges will be how to contribute to their communities, not how they will survive.

Our goal of seeing 2070 of our scholars earn a college degree within six years of graduating high school begins as soon as they enroll in an Uplift school. At every campus in 2013–14, our team focused on getting our scholars to a place where college graduation is a very real and attainable outcome. We immediately assess our scholars' academic skill levels and set goals using the Northwest Evaluation Association's Measures of Academic Progress® (MAP®).

We surround our scholars with college symbols, fight songs, cheers, mascots and the expectation that they will attend and graduate from college one day.

We give our scholars individualized attention during specialized instructional time built into the weekly schedule.

We use group time to teach teamwork and encourage respect for classmates. We continually reinforce community service and kindness toward others.


Opportunity to grow

We all recognize that education is a process of growth. We take for granted that it happens in every classroom every day, but **8%** means that it is not happening with consistent quality in our country. At Uplift, we know every scholar can make extraordinary academic gains, especially when we set high expectations. Using the MAP® test and the ACT® Plan and Explore sequence of tests, we set rigorous goals for all of our scholars and then track their progress as they work towards those goals.



STAAR Stellar Results

In reading and math, Uplift scholars outperform their local and state peers on Texas' STAAR test. The chart below depicts STAAR Level 2 or higher pass rate percentages for scholars in 3rd through 8th grades.



* Region 10 emcompasses the greater Dallas area, and Region 11 emcompasses the greater Fort Worth area.


Ready for Higher Learning - ACT Score Growth

In high school, the ACT line of tests helps us measure how scholars are growing compared to national norms. On average, our scholars are achieving college-ready scores, but more importantly, they are showing growth from sophomore to senior year. The chart below shows the ACT scoring gains for our scholars from 10th to 11th grade at our five high schools.



Getting Better With Time

The longer scholars are with us the more likely they are to exceed national averages on NWEA's Measures of Academic Progress® (MAP®) growth assessment.

Opportunity to experience

One thing that contributes to the **8%** is a lack of opportunity to try new things. We recognize the importance of allowing scholars to learn through experience. Our relationships with the Perot Museum, Big Thought, Boys and Girls Clubs, YMCA, Trinity River Audubon Center, the Fort Worth Symphony, Bridge Lacrosse and so many other groups help us enrich our school experiences. Our scholars take part in robotics and science fair competitions. They create smartphone applications, study the Trinity River basin, and on every campus, they learn to express themselves through visual and performing arts.

When scholars have the opportunity to try different things, they discover interests that will motivate them throughout life. With that passion guided throughout school, scholars will drive the **8%** number sky-high.







Our scholars have access to more than **3,900** laptops, Chromebooks and tablets, and **250** sports, clubs and specials classes. "I think it is important to not just teach art, but show scholars how math, history and other academic subjects tie into art. I strive to teach them skills they can take with them into the future."







8% to more than 70%: it's a bold goal. We owe it to all of our scholars to help them achieve that important college degree. It will mean more than \$1 million in earnings during their lifetimes, not to mention countless opportunities to engage in a meaningful career.

While we are proud of the 1,072 scholars who have earned high school diplomas from Uplift over the past four years and are persisting in college at a rate over 80%, there are still many more students who want to attend an Uplift school. Serving these additional students requires



more schools. For the 2014-15 school year, we expanded into the city of Grand Prairie with two new schools. Additionally we opened new primary buildings at Uplift Hampton and Uplift Infinity and a new secondary building at Uplift Heights. This growth is part of our \$250 million strategic plan to see the network grow to 38 schools and enrollment to more than 19,000 scholars by 2020.

Our capital plan includes both public bond sales and philanthropy. We are nearing the end of a five-year, \$64 million capital campaign. In 2013, the Hamon Foundation gave Uplift a \$12.5 million matching gift to help us finish strong. Your participation in the campaign will turn that generous gift into \$25 million and increase the number of scholars we can serve. 
