1	Abra Cadabra and the Tooth Witch (Week 1): Before the tooth fairy existed, a grumpy old witch had the task of collecting children's teeth. After doing the job well for 600 years, the witch got tired and bored. When she loses a bag of teeth, the witch council decides she needs some help. They enlist a meek, younger witch named Abra Cadabra. <u>Bebe Goes Shopping</u> (Week 1): A quick trip to the supermercado? Not with Bebe in the shopping cart. Snatching the grocery list and picking out chocolate-covered pickles, he's not being very helpful. <u>Night Boy</u> (Week 2):Night is a boy who knows it's much more fun to play than go to sleep. When the sun sets, he travels through the night sky in a spaceship with his teddy. Night's favorite game is hide-and-go-seek, which he plays each evening with his older sister, Day. But why can't he ever find her? <u>Turtle, Turtle, Watch Out!</u> (Week 2): Sea turtles face many dangers as they grow, eat, travel, and breed. In this dramatization of one female turtle's challenges, acclaimed nature writer April Pulley Sayre highlights the role that humans have in helping this endangered species. <u>Not 'Til Tomorrow Phoebe</u> (Week 3): Phoebe's day is full of tomorrows: Mama says they can make pancakes, her teacher announces musicians will visit the class, and Phoebe will get ice cream after her haircut—but none of it 'til tomorrow. Phoebe feels frustrated and impatient. Why can't these good things happen right now? <u>A Ticket Around the World</u> (Week 3): Join a young boy as he hops around the globe, visiting friends in 13 different countries spanning all 6 populated continents. <u>Diary of a Fly</u> (Week 4): This is the diaryof a fly. A fly who, when she's not landing on your head or swimming in your soup, is trying to escape her 327 borthers and sisters who are driving her crazy! <u>Home For Pearl Squirre!</u> (Week 4): Pearl learns about the different types of homes and habitats in which her woodland friends live and play. Diversity is explored and championed in this tale of self-appreciation. H Le



	Little Boy (Week 5): The simple playthings, the everyday moments, picking up that hundredth rock all of these are brimming with possibilityif you slow down and let the future begin with the small moments of today. A Camping Spree With Mr. McGee (Week 6): Mr. Magee and his trusty dog, Dee, are enjoying a peaceful camping trip when all of a sudden they find themselves plunging down a mountain and teetering on the edge of a huge waterfall! How will they find their way out of this slippery situation? Snap! (Week 6): Snap! Scritch! Whoosh! There goes another crayon! What could be more perfect than a brand new set of crayons? Evan can't wait to use them, until Snap!, the brown one breaks in two. Evan discovers that even with just a few crayons, he can create new and exciting art—his imagination is the only tool he needs. The Man With The Violin (Week 7): "The Man with the Violin" is based on the true story of Joshua Bell, the renowned American violinist who famously took his instrument down into the Washington D.C. subway for a free concert. The Best Mariachi in the World (Week 7): Everyone in Gustavo's family is in a mariachi band Everyone except Gustavo, that is. Gustavo would love to join the band, but he can't play any of the instruments. Clever Beatrice (Week 8:) What happens when a very little girl makes a bet with a very LARGE giant?
2	Can Hens Give Milk (Week 1): On Tova's farm, anything might be possible. Tova's farm has hens and even a rooster, but no cow. Her mother, Rivka, wishes they could afford to buy a cow, so they could have fresh milk and butter every day. One night Tova's father has a dream about how to get milk without actually owning a cow. What will happen next? Angus All Aglow (Week 1): Angus loves sparkly things, so much so that he can hear them. His unique ability is lost, however, when Angus wears his grandma's beaded necklace to school, and his classmates tease him for his atypical choice. Saddened by their laughter, Angus stops hearing the sparkle. From Far Away (Week 2): This story is based on the real-life experience of Saoussan Askar, who emigrated with her family from war-torn Lebanon when she was seven years old. The Ghost Catcher (Week 2): This story is a retelling of a traditional Bengali tale in which a kind and generous Indian barber, pressed by his father and then his wife to earn more money, cleverly persuades a ghost to bring him riches. Whale's World (Week 3): A Whale's World follows a pod of spy-hopping orcas as they explore the ecosystems of the Great Bear Sea while hunting for their next meal. Past rocky shores and through kelp forests, they observe foraging wolves, hungry grizzly bears, curious black bears, graceful fin whales, splashing porpoises, slippery seals and other members of the Pacific coastal food web. Animals in Camouflage (Week 3): Incredible illustrations highlight this striking book introducing animals in camouflage. The lush illustrations alone will enthrall readers, but clues to seven remarkably well-hidden animals will draw them into new worlds. Geronimo Stilton, Volume 5: The Great Ice Age (Week 4): When Geronimo's nemeses the Pirate Cats try to travel through time to the year 1889, they accidentally end up in 37993 BC! When the cats meet their Neanderthal ancestors, they hear the



	 legend of a Giant Wooly Mammoth and come up with a plan to capture it and bring it back to the present, making them famous for all time. Geronimo must travel to the Ice Age to stop the cats from changing history forever! <u>Castle on Hester Street</u> (Week 5): A flying goat, buttons the size of sleds, and a castle on Hester Street are some of the widely imaginative stories Julie's grandpa tells her about his journey from Russia to New York many years ago. But Grandma's no-nonsense memories are far different from Grandpa's tall tales. <u>Pet Peeves</u> (Week 6): Dennis has a great idea for making money. But it won't work unless he can get his bossy big brother to help out. That's no easy job! <u>Siblings</u> (Week 6): Sometimes they make us crazy, but brothers and sisters can be one of the best parts of growing up. <u>A Sack Full of Feathers</u> (Week 7): Yankel loves to tell stories, as long as they are someone else's. He does not see the hurt that his stories cause, the way they spread and change. Then the rabbi hands him a bag of feathers and tells him to place one on every doorstep in the village. Yankel is changed by what happens and finds himself with his best story yet, one of his very own. <u>Enemy Pie</u> (Week 8): It was the perfect summer. That is, until Jeremy Ross moved into the house down the street and became neighborhood enemy number one. Luckily Dad had a surefire way to get rid of enemies: Enemy Pie. But part of the secret recipe is spending an entire day playing with the enemy! In this funny yet endearing story, one little boy learns effective recipes for turning your best friend. <u>Odd Velvet</u> (Week 8): Velvet is odd. Instead of dolls that talk and cry, Velvet brings a milkweed pod for show and tell. She wins the class art context using only an eight-pack of crayons. She likes to collect rocks. Even her name is strange—Velvet! But as the school year unfolds, the things Velvet does and the things that Velvet says slowly begin to make sense. And, in the end
